
Approximate Run Times

Act 1: 1 Hour and 10 Minutes Act 2: 1 Hour

Intermission: 15 Minutes Total: 2 Hours and 25 Minutes

General Considerations

- This is a musical with lots of singing and dancing.
- There are large set pieces that shift between and during scenes. Lights will also shift.
- Most scene transitions have music underscoring.
- Candles and fires onstage are artificial.
- Theatrical haze is used throughout most of the production.
- Audience members are likely to applaud after songs and scenes.
- Our Relaxed Performance is on December 15th at 6:30pm. A Sensory Light will be visible during this performance to warn of moments that are bolded in the descriptions below. In addition, the house lights will remain on at a low level throughout the performance.

- Blackout after speech



Scene 1 London Streets

- MUSIC: GOD REST YE MERRY GENTLEMEN
- Snow falls
- MUSIC: GLOUCESTSHIRE WASSAIL



Scene 2 Counting House

- Content: Scrooge is unkind to his visitors
- Shouting
- MUSIC: GOD REST YE MERRY GENTLEMEN
- Sound: Clock chimes





Scene 3 London Streets

- MUSIC: THE HOLLY AND THE IVY
- MUSIC: DOLL DANCE
- MUSIC: SUNNY BANK
- A deep voice is heard whispering "Scrooge, Ebenezer Scrooge" while projections show the face of Jacob Marley





- Shouting
- MUSIC: COVENTRY CAROL

Scene 4 Scrooge's Bedchamber

- Content: This is a scary scene with many loud sounds and special effects.
- Scrooge eats loudly
- Marley appears above the fireplace
- MUSIC: GOOD KING WENCESLAS
- Walls split open to reveal Marley
- Shouting
- Marley wraps his chains around Scrooge
- Marley exits through a trapdoor

Scene 5 Scrooge's Bedchamber & Scrooge's Childhood

- Content: Scrooge is visiting memories of his past, some of which are sad. Death is discussed.
- The Ghost of Christmas Past appears suddenly
- A musical trill is heard each time Christmas Past uses her magic
- MUSIC: AWAY IN A MANGER
- A carriage and jingle bells are heard in surround sound
- Children have a snowball fight
- Transition: Loud sounds, lights will flash different colors



Scene 6 Scrooge's Young Adulthood, Scrooge's Bedchamber

- Content: Scrooge is visiting memories of his past, some of which are sad. Separation is discussed.
- Cheering and shouting
- MUSIC: MY DANCING DAY
- MUSIC: SUSANNI
- MUSIC: SUSANNI REPRISE
- MUSIC: OH COME, OH COME, IMMANUEL
- End of Act 1: Curtain down & house lights up

Scene 1 Scrooge's Bedchamber

- Blackout before curtain opens
- The Ghost of Christmas Present appears to be very tall and will then become typical height
- MUSIC: THE BOAR'S HEAD CAROL



Scene 2 Cratchit House

- MUSIC: THE HOLLY AND THE IVY
- MUSIC: THE OTHER NIGHT
- Content: Scrooge and Christmas Present discuss the possibility of Tiny Tim dying.







Scene 3 Fred's Party

- Music plays will guests dance
- Cheering and shouting
- Content: Party guests tease Scrooge
- MUSIC: GREENSLEEVES
- Stage darkens as characters leave
- Transition: Loud sounds, lights, and fog create a scary atmosphere to introduce the Ghost of Christmas Yet To Come







Scene 4 Visions of the Furture

• Content: The Ghost of Christmas Yet To Come shows Scrooge upsetting visions of the future.



Scene 5 Future: Bedchamber

- Content: Scrooge sees the vision of a dead man lying still in his bed.
- Loud laughing
- Sound: loud bed creaking

Scene 6
Future: Cratchit
House

- Content: Scrooge sees the vision of the Cratchit family mourning the death of Tiny Tim.
- MUSIC: THE OTHER NIGHT
- Tiny Tim is head singing.
- As the song concludes, there are lights, fog, and loud sounds.
- Loud voices say "EBENEZER SCROOGE."
- Content: A tombstone appears. Scrooge is frightened.
- Transition: Clock sounds, music, and lights shift as the bedroom is set.



Scene 7 Scrooge's Home

• Transition: Blackout as set pieces shift



Scene 8 London Streets

- Bright lights
- MUSIC: GOOD CHRISTIAN MEN, REJOICE
- MUSIC: HERE WE COME A WASSAILING



Snow falling



Scene 9 Cratchit House

- Cheering and Shouting
- MUSIC: HERE WE COME A WASSAILING II
- GOD REST YE FINALE
- Transition: Blackout



Curtain Call

- MUSIC: GOD REST YE MERRY GENTLEMEN
- Snow falls into the audience using loud machines
